Introduction and background

 This report is made to the Licensing & Gambling Acts Casework Sub- Committee so it may determine in accordance with its powers and the Licensing Act 2003 whether to grant a Premises Licence to Mr Islam.

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Application Summary

2. An application for a New Premises Licence has been submitted by Mr Wahidul Islam. A summary of the licensable activities applied for and the time proposed for these activities can be found detailed below:

Supply of Alcohol (On and Off Sales)

Monday to Thursday 12:00 (noon) until 00:00 (midnight) Friday to Sunday 12:00 (noon) until 01:00 hours

Films, Indoor Sporting Events, Live Music, Recorded Music, Performance of Dance, Similar Entertainment to Music or Dance (Both Indoors and Outdoors):

Monday to Thursday 12:00 (noon) until 00:00 (midnight) Friday to Sunday 12:00 (noon) until 01:00 hours

Late Night Refreshment (Both Indoors and Outdoors):

Monday to Thursday 23:00 until 00:00 (midnight) Friday to Sunday 23:00 until 01:00 hours

Non-Standard Timings for All Licensable Activities:

On New Years' Eve from 12:00 (noon) until 02:00 hours

Cumulative Impact

- 13. Oxford City Council has adopted Special Saturation Policies in respect of the City Centre and East Oxford as detailed within the Statement of Licensing Policy.
- 14. The Special Saturation Policies were introduced following evidence brought by Thames Valley Police on the grounds of the cumulative impact of premises licensed for the sale of alcohol on the licensing objectives of preventing crime and disorder and preventing public nuisance within the defined areas.
- 15. The effect of adopting Special Saturation Policies is to create a rebuttable presumption that applications for new Premises Licences or Club Premises Certificates or material variations to these will normally be refused, if relevant representations to that effect are received, unless it can be demonstrated that the operation of the premises involved will not add significantly to the cumulative impact already being experienced on the licensing objectives of preventing crime and disorder and preventing public nuisance.

Other Relevant Considerations

- 16. The Sub-Committee is reminded of its responsibilities under the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 (to co-operate in the reduction of crime and disorder in Oxford) and the Human Rights Act (which guarantees the right to a fair hearing for all parties in the determination of their civil rights, and also provides for the protection of property, which may include licences in existence, and the protection of private and family life) when considering the fair balance between the interests of the applicant and the rights of local residents. Any decision taken by the Sub-Committee must be necessary and proportionate to the objectives being pursued.
- 17. Members are reminded that whenever they make a decision under the Licensing Act 2003, they have a duty to act with a view to promoting the licensing objectives.
- 18. When considering any representations, only those issues relating to the four licensing objectives should be considered and appropriate weight given to the importance and relevance of each representation.
- 19. In making its decision, Members must also have regard to the Home Office statutory guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 and the Council's own Statement of Licensing Policy.
- 20. The Sub-Committee must take such of the following steps as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives:
 - a) Grant the licence in accordance with the application.

- b) Modify the conditions of the operating schedule by altering or omitting or adding to them.
- c) Exclude or restrict from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates.
- d) Reject the whole of the application.

The Sub-Committee may also grant the licence subject to different conditions for different parts of the premises or the different licensable activities.

- 21. Members are asked to note that they may not modify the conditions or reject whole or part of the application merely because they consider it desirable to do so. It must be appropriate to do so in order to promote the licensing objectives. Any such step must relate to a relevant representation made.
- 22. If Members grant the application, the details of the operating schedule will be incorporated into the licence as conditions. The licence will also be subject to certain mandatory conditions.
- 23. Members should note that the applicant or persons making representations have the right of appeal against the decision made by the Sub-Committee.



With regard to the above;

Mr Islam had made an application for a Premises Licence for the purposes of Live music, recorded music, dance, anything similar and for late night refreshment and sale of alcohol.

Thames Valley Police are objecting to this application on the basis of all the Licensing Objectives.

The application form indicates that his business revolves round the sale of dessert foods and now he wants the sales of alcohol to be added – this is an unusually strange concept. The application asks for the above (1st paragraph) aspects of Licensable activities, also put this together with the submitted plan all indicate that he wishes to extend his Dessert business into a bar with food as secondary. #whilst this venue is comparatively small in capacity it is in a fairly popular location. Thames Valley Police like to have close working relationships with our licensed premises so to ensure 'Due Dilligence' and adherence to legislation are paramount. Thames Valley Police like to see and support as far as practical a vibrant, successful night time economy however this must be balanced with the needs of the area ansd in conjunction consideration must be given to local residents and local businesses.

The area in which this premises are located is within the afforded East Oxford SSP as there is a recognition of a disproportionate levels of crime, disorder and nuisance in the area linked to the numbers of licensed premises and the levels of consumption of alcohol based beverages and the extensive provisions of the NTE in this area.

In talking of balance we are talking about the need of business /profit of a licensed premises and the needs of the overall area – local residents etc. The SSP is not the to manage each premises but to understand and oversee the cumulative impact the large number of licensed premises has on the area and on the four licensing objectives in particular.

With a large residential student presence and also the influx of friends coming to the area, this impact as well on the general residential population also not just visting the area at weekends but now also during the week. The policing of this area is now quite a delicate and sensitive issue and another reason why the SSP is so important to East Oxford and therefore still in being.

Thames Valley Police are concerned with the introduction of another alcohol led premises, this will increase the chances of further Anti Social Behaviour / Crime and Disorder within the area to the detriment of the general public. The application seeks to introduce live & recorded music, Late night refreshment and the sale of alcohol to be served in the premises;-

The application also seeks to extend the licesable activities until 02.00 hours on the morning following New Years Eve – depending on the day of the week this could extend licensable activities by +2 hours.

The application is for the sale of alcohol both ON and OFF the premises thus increasing the chance of further antisocial behaviour, crime or disorder

It also looks to provide Live and Recorded music and Dance or something similar to both inside and outside the venue – this will increase the aspects of 'public nuisance'

This application in the view of Thames Valley Police will not only attract more footfall to the area as another late night bar open, it will also in our view further retain persons within the area this having a cumulative impact on public nuisance, crime and disorder or increasing it because of the increase in intoxication within the premises possibly giving rise to arguments should service be refused due to age, intoxication or behaviour.

As this area has no travel hub as does the City this therefore does not aid the the dispersal of persons from the area of the SSP thus to help to prevent an exacerbation of issues against the licensing area. As the committee are fully aware there are local buses that assist to remove footfall to other areas such as Blackbird Leys and Cowley centre, Headington or the use of pre booked taxi's as there is no taxi rank and therefore persons awaiting in queues for public transport could be a spark point for disorder.

In his application I will recognise that Mr Islam has offered a number of conditions that he feels will meet the Licensing Objectives within the SSP – unfortunately for a bar in this area they fall quite short of what would be expected to mitigate the satisfactory level of further impact in the cumlutavie effect.

There are of course a number of options open to the Panel in deciding this matter and should they be minded to allow the application then Thames Valley Police would be happy to advise on suggested re wording of present conditions offered and the additional conditions deemed necessary to manage this environment.

The basis of the Licensing Acts FOUR objectives are; To PREVENT crime and disorder, to PREVENT public nuisance, to PROTECT public safety and to PROTECT children from harm – these are all at risk should this premises be allowed to serve alcohol, have live & recorded music and dance in the premises – as you will see from the provided plan this appears to all take place in the empty area to the bottom of the plan. Not only is it the responsibility of the Police and other Relevant Authorities but also the Licensing Authority has a responsibility to promote the licensing objectives.

I am minded by the comments of District Judge Patterson in relation to an appeal made against the City Council for an East Oxford premsies wishing to extend hours within the SSP when he stated;

The effect on the area is wider than the immediate vicinity of the premises. It is not necessarily the direct consequences of the application proposal that concern me but the bigger picture in terms of impact on the area. I am satisfied that there are real problems created by longer hours for the sale of alcohol. I have had regard to the Special Saturation Policy which is designed to help limit these problems.

It is therefore in the assessment of Thames Valley Police that this application would significantly increase the time available for consumption of alcohol with a consequent increased risk of crime and disorder, and as such we believe it to be incompatible with the City Councils' special saturation policy (SSP) resulting in our objection to its grant.

I thank you for email of the 8th June 2017 and I wish to address the concerns that you have raised.

You state that the sale of dessert food and the sale of alcohol is "an unusually strange concept".

This may have been the case in the past but the sale of alcoholic desserts has now become very fashionable both in the United States, this Country and Europe.

I attach herewith a summary of the products which we wish to serve and it is these products which we wish to specialise in. I know no other business in Oxford that is doing what we are planning to do. I will be setting a new trend and fashion for Oxford and I wish to open as soon as possible as no doubt other businesses in Oxford will be attempting to do the same. Though the concept has now become popular and widespread, we will be unique in introducing this concept to Oxford.

I can confirm that food will not be secondary as indicated in your email, but desserts will be the core of the business.

The recent closure of licensed premises such as Bar Baby, which was a club and Aziz Restaurant other licenced premises within a very close proximity and if anything else in the locality there is an overall reduction in the sale of alcohol in the area. Our pricing structure will be high and not just a cut price alcohol shop. If that is what people want they can get it from Co-Op and off-license. Therefore, it is unlikely people would get drunk at our premises, but enjoy a measured amount of alcohol.

The Divinity Road Area Residents Association has the following concerns regarding the above application:

The application seeks to permit live and recorded music and dance to take place both inside and outside. It is not clear what the nature of the outside area is (it does not appear to be shown on the attached plan) but all these activities at any time would create a nuisance and especially so at the hours covered by the licence application.

Section H does not specify what activity is intended.

There is a very real problem with anti-social behaviour in the DRARA and other residential areas along the Cowley Road and an increase in any establishments serving alcohol late in the evening and into the night is a cause of considerable concern for local residents.

There is a lack of information as to what efforts if any will be made to minimise further antisocial behaviour, though ultimately premises are limited in what they can do to prevent disturbances after customers depart.

For these reasons DRARA objects to the current application and hopes that it will be refused.
