#### **SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS**

This report sets out draft grant funding themes and criteria for awarding grants to voluntary & community organisations, and updates on the timetable for the next funding cycle for the 2003 / 2004 financial year.

#### **Executive Board are asked to:**

- a) Approve the grant themes set out in Appendix 1
- b) Approve the basic requirements eligibility set out in Appendix 2
- c) Approve the further criteria to be met by organisations requesting partnership grant funding set out in Appendix 3
- d) Approve the grant funding themes criteria drawn up by business units in Appendix 4

1. Background

Following the review of grants to voluntary & community groups by the Finance & Performance Monitoring overview & scrutiny committee, Executive Board on 19<sup>th</sup> August requested a report setting out future grant funding themes and criteria for awarding grants.

2. Grant Funding Themes

Draft grant funding themes are attached as Appendix 1. The suggested themes are based on the objectives contained in the revised Council Vision that is currently being consulted on. It is anticipated that when the Executive Board are advised on the level of requests received for 2003 / 2004, and are deciding the grants budget in December, the objectives will have been ranked in priority order. Grant priorities will follow in line with these, allowing resources to be targeted to the highest ranking themes.

3. Basic Requirements

Appendix 2 sets out a list of basic requirements which, it is proposed, community and voluntary organisations must meet to be eligible for grant funding from the City Council.

4. Partnership grants criteria

Appendix 3 contains further criteria that an organisation must meet if requesting a partnership agreement grant which would allocate funding for a 3-year period.

5. Funding Themes Criteria

Finally, Appendix 4 contains draft funding themes criteria, which have been drawn up by Business Units, which would also form part of the assessment process and ensure that funding is targeted to those organisations which assist the council to deliver its objectives.

6. Timetable for grants process 2003 / 2004.

A revised application form is currently being developed along with clear guidelines and an assessment matrix for officers to score applications. The application form will be available on request from 4<sup>th</sup> October, and will also be sent to all organisations that received a grant last year. In order to meet the deadlines of the new grants process the closing date for applications will be 29<sup>th</sup> November.

# **Oxford City Council Vision**

The City Council aims to make Oxford a city that all of its people can be proud of, regardless of their background or the area in which they live.

Grants are targeted at applications that show how they can help us achieve these objectives and the following strategic aims:

- > Tackling poverty through advice & information giving
- > Promoting social inclusion and equality
- > Tackling Homelessness
- > Promoting Community safety and health & well being
- > Community sector support e.g. neighbourhood projects, playschemes, youth & community activities, Twinning.
- > Supporting Arts, Culture and leisure pursuits.
- > Improving our local environments
- Creating local prosperity and employment.

The Council will prioritise these strategic aims and target grant aid to those projects that can help us deliver them most effectively.

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# BASIC REQUIREMENTS FOR GRANT AID

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Community and Voluntary groups who wish to apply for a grant from Oxford City Council must meet the following basic requirements:

- 1. Be a voluntary or community group run by a committee, and have a constitution or appropriate rules laying out aims & objectives and stating how the group will operate.
- 2. The grant will be of direct benefit primarily to Oxford Residents.
- 3. The organisation has a bank or building society account & can provide an up to date bank statement.
- 4. Have proper accounting procedures and can provide copies of the previous year's accounts (which may have to be audited or independently examined depending on how much you are requesting / annual turnover). If a new organisation please provide a financial plan and income and expenditure details to date.
- 5. Organisations must have an equal opportunities statement and be actively committed to develop and implement practices that tackle discrimination.
- 6. If organisations are requesting funds to employ staff then they should ensure that employees are paid at least the minimum wage.
- Organisations will be required to sign an appropriate agreement that will set out the conditions attached to any grant awarded.
- 8. Organisations are expected to co-operate with City Council monitoring procedures to verify how grant moneys have been spent.
- 9. Organisations applying for grants do not have to be registered charities. However, applicants should be aware that charities with incomes of over £1000 are required to register with the Charity Commission. Oxford City Council is aware that many community and smaller voluntary groups have yet to register as charities. Applicants for grant aid are expected to look in to their responsibilities with the Charities Commission. Details can be obtained from the Charities Commission, Taunton Tel. 0870 333 0123.

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#### PARTNERSHIP GRANTS CRITERIA

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In addition to meeting the 'Basic requirements for Grant Aid' to qualify for a partnership grant the application will:

- 1. Request a sum of over £10,000.
- 2. Application demonstrates how project to be funded will assist Council meet its strategic aims and list clear outcomes which will improve the well being of Oxford City residents.
- 3. Project can demonstrate how it will cover more than one of council's objectives cross cutting, and provide evidence of the projects primary aim and additional aims.
- 4. Application clearly demonstrates the need for the project providing evidence and need for City Council funding. Will clearly list consequences to Oxford City if project not funded by Oxford City Council. Will indicate how City Councils funding enables project to lever in other funds. Application will provide evidence that other funders have been approached.
- 5. Organisation will provide a business plan to cover whole period requesting funding for (3 years) which will include projected income and expenditure.
