Review & Assessment Appraisal Report

The Report sets out the Detailed Assessment, which forms part of the Review & Assessment process required under the Environment Act 1995 and subsequent Regulations.

It covers nitrogen dioxide and PM_{10} and concludes that an Air Quality Management Area will be required for NO_2 .

On the basis of the evidence provided by the local authority, the conclusions reached are **accepted for all pollutants**.

Commentary

The report is well structured and provides most of the information specified in the Guidance.

The following items need to be addressed by the local authority to complete the report satisfactorily:

- In order to ensure that all the information in this report can be interpreted by a reader the full details of the monitoring undertaken for NO2 and PM10 should be included.
- Wolvercote, Cutteslowe and Green Road roundabouts should now be included in new AQMA declarations where public exposure exists.
- Although there is some evidence that Banbury Rd / Marston Ferry Rd, Abingdon Road / Weirs Lane and Iffly Rd / Donnington Bridge Rd may exceed the annual NO2 objective the case is not yet compelling. Monitoring should be conducted at these locations in areas of public exposure in order that the risk of exceedence can be determined.
- The St Aldates AUN site exceeds the 1 hour NO2 objective in 2003 according to the data presented in the DA. There is also evidence from the diffusion tube network to suggest that there is a risk of the 1 hour objective being exceeded in Oxford. If there is public exposure in the vicinity of the St Aldates site then an AQMA should be declared. If there is 1 hour public exposure in the existing AQMA then the 1 hour objective should be added to the AQMA declaration.



Oxford City - Local Air Quality Management: Detailed Assessment

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the detailed assessment. Firstly I would like to note the acknowledgement by the County Council of its role in air quality management. This was recently reinforced at the County Executive on the 7th December when considering the Environment Scrutiny Review on Air Quality.

As you are aware we have agreed to jointly developing the Air Quality Action Plan in the framework of the local Transport Plan. The Local Transport Plan will recognise that Air Quality is a 'shared priority' in terms of local and national requirements. Consultation on the Local Transport Plan will be held both with City Members and wider public, before submission to DfT in July 2005.

The additional locations put forward in the Detailed Assessment as potential Air Quality Management Areas (AQMA) are already on the transport agenda to deal mainly with congestion and improve public transport reliability. We recognise that the air quality issues should also be considered in scheme development. Whilst not contesting the Air Quality thresholds which have been predicted for these locations it should be noted that the decisions for action have to be taken in the context of other criteria under consideration and priorities for action, and that any proposed measures or schemes are required to demonstrate cost effectiveness. Some work has commenced on scheme development but further detail and decisions will be in the lifetime of the next Local Transport Plan, 2006-11.

I note that a relatively cautious approach has been taken in the Detailed Assessment indicating locations that may exceed air quality objectives. I would expect that in more detailed work which may proceed if AQMAs are declared at these locations we will be able to understand better the magnitude of the problem and relevance to public exposure and therefore for both City and County Councils to agree on the appropriate level of action.

If declaration of these areas is not included at this time I would assume that reconsideration will be given in the next round of USA and DA reporting. In the meantime it would be prudent, and expected, to consider air quality issues at the locations noted in the DA, namely Wolvercote, Cutteslowe and Green Road Roundabouts in the scheme development already in progress.
