

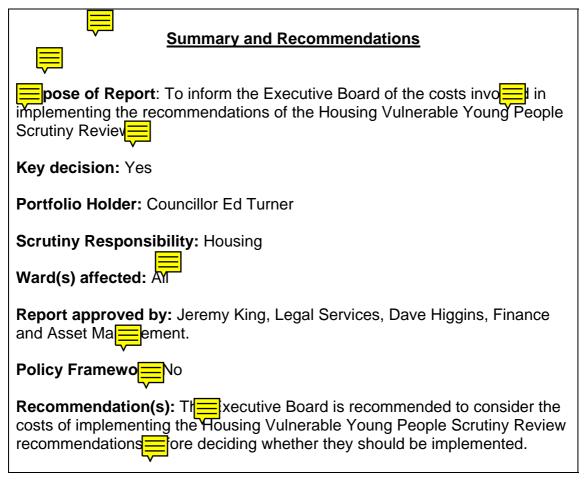

#### **Work Programme**

Before a scheme is developed, a number of factors should be considered:</li> <li>Is there a significant need that should be met by the Council – there is emergency young people's accommodation in the city (the Bridge);</li> <li>Should Supporting People fund this kind of project rather then Oxford City Council?</li> <li>The risks of such a scheme need to be considered. The City Council investigate the feasibility of installing greater security measures in all Council owned temporary accommodation hostels/houses and/or employing wardens to increase safety and reduce damage to properties.	Graham Stratford/Dennis Boobier	Since the review was carried out, the number of Council owned hostels has been reduced from 12 to 2. Both the Council hostels contain self-contained units, CCTV systems and are visited daily by TAM's. Issues with CCTV have been identified and ways to improve security are being considered in the effort to continually improve services. The cost of employing staff to provide out-of-hours cover could be prohibitive and can't be met from current budgets. If the Executive Board approve the recommendation a budget bid may be necessary. If repair costs reduce as a result of spending on security, savings in this area could be made in future years.	Work on the feasibility of greater security, including improvements to CCTV and employing extra staff could be met from current resources. Costs of implementing such measures would need to be considered in the future, and could be prohibitive (Likely to be well above £50,000 p.a. for a minimum level of out of hours cover). Temporary Accommodation Managers should be allowed enough time to help people settle in to temporary accommodation. An extra member of staff may be needed to do this. Employing an extra member of staff would help to alleviate this problem, but currently there is no budget for this. The cost of employing another TAM would be £35,750 p.a. The City Council should continue to view young offenders on a case-by-case basis if they present as homeless and help them to find suitable accommodation where possible. The introduction of Key 2 housing for high needs care leavers has been successful in helping care leavers adapt to life once they have left Council care – approximately 80% of Key 2 residents are successful in finding employment or training. Changing the Council's allocations policy to give a % of Council accommodation to care leavers each year is not favoured by officers. This recommendation should be tracked by the Scrutiny Committee, who will carry out follow up work if necessary. The City Council already supports projects aimed at helping young offenders break the cycle of offending. For example, the REACH and Iris Projects. The City Council provides temporary accommodation (not homelessness accommodation) to young people on these schemes. Contact with HMP Bullingdon and the Probation Service is good, and the Options Team will continue to work with these organisations to help young offenders where they can.
