general feeling that the Council should be providing subsidised services to some residents.

- The Jury were also keen on preventative measures to reduce the need for future spending although the exact means by which this was to be achieved was not agreed by everyone. For example, whilst all the Jury agreed that spending on the local environment could be reduced through encouraging individual responsibility, the measures recommended varied from 'carrot' to 'stick' approaches. Some members felt that more punitive action, such as anti-social behaviour orders were necessary, whilst other favoured better leisure provision or more funds to tackle substance abuse.
- Several members of the Jury felt that the City Council was providing services that would be better provided by other agencies. For example, health advice by the PCT and anti-social behaviour measures by the police.
- Most of the Jury felt that they had learned a considerable amount about the way that the Council allocates its funds. In particular, most were unaware of the split responsibilities of the City and County Councils, as well as the relatively small amount of their Council Tax that went to the City Council.

A number of specific recommendations were made, both through the exercises and subsequent discussions. These were:

- Housing benefit should be administered more efficiently, particularly cutting expensive items such as counter service.
- Leisure centres should offer value for money services, opening when it is cost effective to do so and therefore absorbing less Council funding. Management should remain in Council hands unless there is clear evidence that a saving could be made otherwise. Services should remain subsidised for those that need it in any case.
- The City Council should spend more of its budget on developing affordable housing and less on housing support services.
- The local environment would be improved if less was spent on public conveniences, street cleaning and tourism, and more was spent on refuse collection and street bins.
- Anti-social behaviour, crime and damage to the local environment is an issue that was important to all the Jury, but solutions differed considerably.
 Some felt it could be cut through investing in fresh measures to tackle

substance abuse and addictions, while others wanted to invest more in the Council's existing measures.

- The budget to street wardens was cut and generally the Jury were unsure what they did, how they differed from community support officers and whether they were needed. The lack of formal powers was felt to be an issue that detracted from their role and it was suggested that the boundaries of the two positions should be examined.
- The City Council should not subsidise the profits of private firms in public transport. Suggestions were made to ensure that bus companies 'paid their way' and did not profit at the expense of the Council.
- The many health advisory services that the Council provides should be evaluated to ensure that there is no unnecessary overlap.




