- 3. To agree that the monitoring information will be used by the Officer Grants Panel in deciding subsequent applications from the same group. It will appear in the 2010-11 and subsequent grants prospectuses that this information will be used in this way.

Introduction

- 1. At City Executive Board on 18 February 2009, a report about the monitoring information returned by community and voluntary organisations awarded a grant in 2008-09 was requested. This paper and the appendices form that report.
- 2. Listed in the attached appendices are the community and voluntary organisations / groups awarded a grant through the opening bidding and commissioning processes for 2008-09. The spreadsheets show the following information:
 - Name of organisation / group
 - Amount of grant awarded 08-09
 - Description of project/activity
 - Number of beneficiaries
 - Outcomes from project / activity
 - Total amount of matched funding from other sources
- 3. When applying for a grant community and voluntary organisations are asked to choose which council priory their project or activity will primarily contribute towards. For the purpose of this report the monitoring information has been listed under the priority they indicated.

Process for gathering monitoring information

- 4. The requirement to return monitoring information is agreed with community and voluntary groups when they sign their terms and conditions for grant funding.
- 5. The purpose of monitoring is to ensure that the funding awarded to groups is used for the purpose it was given. There is a low risk that monitoring information will not be returned. The process for dealing with this is as follows:
 - At three weeks past the deadline, a first reminder is sent out with a copy of the monitoring form
 - At 6-8 weeks past the deadline, a second reminder is sent with copy of monitoring form followed up by email or telephone call.
 - If there is still no response, this is noted on file for future reference.
- 6. In the majority of cases monitoring information is returned after the first reminder. However in those instances where nothing is returned despite the reminders, it has until now been merely noted on file for future reference.
- 7. City Executive Board are recommended to approve that the monitoring information will be used by the Officer Grants Panel in deciding subsequent applications from the same group.

8. For those groups who fail to return any monitoring information this will reported to City Executive Board and Communities and Partnership Scrutiny Committees but could also impact on any future funding decision. This will appear in the 2010-11 and subsequent grants prospectuses that this information will be used in this way.

Summary of feedback

9. The table below summarises the information listed in the attached appendices for grants awarded through the open bidding section.

- Oxford's population is estimated to be 151,000. The total number of people benefiting from funded projects was 132,761. However it should be noted that one person might well have benefited from more than one project. For example those groups funded under the 2008-09 Council Priority 'Active & Healthy Communities' there were 130,438 beneficiaries but an individual may well have attended a range of activities or events held.

- Oxford City Council commission Advice Centres to give advice on increasing the uptake of welfare benefits and tax credits but also to reduce debt and improve money management for those on low incomes.
- From monitoring information received, from the 5 Advice Centres commissioned, the table above shows the value of this work.

Future commissioning and monitoring arrangements

- 14. As this is the first in an annual series of monitoring reports about the impact of the council's spending on supporting voluntary and community sector partners to deliver our priorities, comments and suggestions about the format of the report are welcome.
- 15. The Grant Officers Group (which has a representative from each of the district councils and the county council) is working together to develop a procedure for joint monitoring of those community and voluntary organisations that are funded by one or more council in Oxfordshire.
- 16. In addition, initial meetings have been held between Oxford City and Oxfordshire County Council to bring our commissioning processes into the same timeframe allowing, where possible, the City and County Council to jointly commission and monitor. It is still very early in the

process and dependent upon the availability of budgets we hope to joint commission and monitor some of our commissioned support for the community and voluntary sector from financial year 2011-12.

Climate change/environmental impact

17. This report notes, amongst other things, the monitoring information received from six organisations funded under the council priority "A Better Living Environment", which specifically supported action to improve the local environment and tackle climate change.

Equalities impact

- 18. Grant funding awarded to community and voluntary organisations has a significant and positive impact on equalities and promotes community cohesion.
- 19. When applying for grant funding each organisation has to supply a copy of their equal opportunities statement to confirm they comply with this legislation

Legal implications

20. There are no legal implications.

Financial implications

- 21. A clause within the terms and conditions for grant funding states that any unspent grant must be returned. A section of the monitoring form requests evidence for this purpose. In some instances not all of the grant funding has been spent. This is usually due to a project taking longer to complete the project work or gain confirmation of match funding before they can proceed.
- 22. When this happens a request is put forward to the appropriate area committee, through the chair and vice-chair, to carry over grant funding into the new financial year. This has been requested by three projects awarded a grant in 2008-09.
- 23. In certain circumstances funding may not have been spent because the project was not successful or they could not spend all of the funding before the end of the financial year. In these instances the funding is returned. For 2009-09, £4,388.75 was returned.
- 24. The recommendations have no financial implications.

EXTRACT FROM THE DRAFT MINUTES OF THE COMMUNITIES AND PARTNERSHIP SCRUTINY COMMITTEE OF 4TH AUGUST 2009

17. GRANTS MONITORING UPDATE

The Head of Community Housing and Community Development submitted a report (previously circulated, now appended). Julia Tomkins (Grants Officer) and Angela Cristofoli (Neighbourhood and Communities Manager) presented the report. During discussion, the following key points were made:-

- Some groups did not appear to be aware of the deadline for submitting monitoring information. Each case needed to be looked at individually, rather than imposing a refusal on groups that did not return information for monitoring;
- Julia Tomkins agreed to circulate the monitoring questionnaire to members of the Committee. It was suggested that a small group be formed in order to review this form;
- Groups needed to be advised clearly of the information that was sought, and some groups might need additional support to produce this. There should be a clear and transparent process that applicants needed to follow;
- Account should be taken of the impact the group, club or society had within the City, and attention should be paid to the group's own fundraising attempts;
- There should be a threshold above which grant monitoring would be more rigorous;
- It was acknowledged that more information about the grants process and its monitoring had been provided this year, and this was to be welcomed. The process would develop as time went by. It was noted that the report would be further updated as information was received from the recipients of grants;
- There was a plan to produce a short film that showed how various groups worked and how grant money was being spent;
- Information concerning the work of OCVA would appear as part of future monitoring.

Resolved that:-

- (1) The recommendation in the report was not endorsed as currently presented;
- (2) The Committee welcomed improvements made to the monitoring process and committed its support to developing this further;

- (3) Councillors Sinclair and Rundle would meet with relevant officers in order to examine possible further improvements to the grant monitoring form, including a sharper measurement of outcomes;
- (4) Consideration would be given to establishing a threshold above which the monitoring process would be more rigorous;
- (5) The concept of joint monitoring of grant giving with Oxfordshire County Council was to be welcomed and encouraged.
