Introduction

Cumulative Impact

- Oxford City Council has adopted Special Saturation Policies in respect of the City Centre and East Oxford as detailed within the Statement of Licensing Policy.
- 12. The Special Saturation Policies were introduced following evidence brought by Thames Valley Police on the grounds of the cumulative impact of premises licensed for the sale of alcohol on the licensing objectives of preventing crime and disorder and preventing public nuisance within the defined areas.
- 13. The effect of adopting Special Saturation Policies is to create a rebuttable presumption that applications for new Premises Licences or Club Premises Certificates or material variations to these will normally be refused, if relevant representations to that effect are received, unless it can be demonstrated that the operation of the premises involved will not add significantly to the cumulative impact already being experienced on the licensing objectives of preventing crime and disorder and preventing public nuisance.

Other Relevant Considerations

- 14. The Sub-Committee is reminded of its responsibilities under the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 (to co-operate in the reduction of crime and disorder in Oxford) and the Human Rights Act (which guarantees the right to a fair hearing for all parties in the determination of their civil rights, and also provides for the protection of property, which may include licences in existence, and the protection of private and family life) when considering the fair balance between the interests of the applicant and the rights of local residents. Any decision taken by the Sub-Committee must be necessary and proportionate to the objectives being pursued.
- 15. Members are reminded that whenever they make a decision under the Licensing Act 2003, they have a duty to act with a view to promoting the licensing objectives.
- 16. When considering any representations, only those issues relating to the four licensing objectives should be considered and appropriate weight given to the importance and relevance of each representation.
- 17. In making its decision, Members must also have regard to the Home Office statutory guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 and the Council's own Statement of Licensing Policy.
- 18. The Sub-Committee must take such of the following steps as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives:
 - a) Grant the licence in accordance with the application.

- b) Modify the conditions of the operating schedule by altering or omitting or adding to them.
- c) Exclude or restrict from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates.
- d) Reject the whole of the application.

The Sub-Committee may also grant the licence subject to different conditions for different parts of the premises or the different licensable activities.

- 19. Members are asked to note that they may not modify the conditions or reject whole or part of the application merely because they consider it desirable to do so. It must be appropriate to do so in order to promote the licensing objectives. Any such step must relate to a relevant representation made.
- 20. If Members grant the application, the details of the operating schedule will be incorporated into the licence as conditions. The licence will also be subject to certain mandatory conditions.
- 21. Members should note that the applicant or persons making representations have the right of appeal against the decision made by the Sub-Committee.

- The premises licence holder shall ensure that all staff employed at the premises whose duties include the sale or supply of alcohol shall undertake training prior to their being authorised to sell alcohol. Such training shall consist of providing staff with an understanding of:

We would not object to a condition being imposed that there should be no sale of intoxicating liquor in the rear of the premises unless an application for variation is granted authorising the same.






- 1. I am writing (on behalf of myself, my family and three other residents of Circus St.) to object to the above licensing application in its present form. My property extends directly behind and next to the premises. Live music (especially amplified music) operating after 11pm is unacceptable in view of the probable noise disturbance. (A nearby similar premises, Cafe Tarifa, has Sun-Thurs 12.00-23.00 and Fri-Sat 12.00-20.00). Opening a licensed restaurant, is of course, acceptable. The current proposed hours of entertainment and alcohol consumption mean it will be running effectively as a nightclub. Any provision for dancing would create the possibility of a 'vertical drinking establishment'. a granting of the current application without changes would, we believe, to the cumulative impact already experienced in this area covered by East Oxford Special Saturation Policy. Circus St. has Cafe Tarifa at one end and Mad Hatter at the other.
- 2. As a minimum, we would expect any granting to be subject to conditions
- a) that any noise emanating from the premises as a result of regulated entertainment and piped music be inaudible when measured at adjacent properties (including my own)

The Sub-Committee is reminded of its responsibilities under the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 (to co-operate in the reduction of crime and disorder in Oxford) and the Human Rights Act (which guarantees the right to a fair hearing for all parties in the determination of their civil rights, and also provides for the protection of property, which may include licences in existence, and the protection of private and family life) when considering the fair balance between the interests of the applicant and the rights of local residents. Any decision taken by the Sub-Committee must be necessary and proportionate to the objectives being pursued.
- 12. Members are reminded that whenever they make a decision under the Licensing Act 2003, they have a duty to act with a view to promoting the licensing objectives.
- 13. When considering any representations, only those issues relating to the four licensing objectives should be considered and appropriate weight given to the importance and relevance of each representation.
- 14. In making its decision, Members must also have regard to the Home Office statutory guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 and the Council's own Statement of Licensing Policy.
- 15. The Sub-Committee must take such of the following steps as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives:
 - a) Grant the licence in accordance with the application.
 - b) Modify the conditions of the operating schedule by altering or omitting or adding to them.
 - c) Exclude or restrict from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates.

d) Reject the whole of the application.

The Sub-Committee may also grant the licence subject to different conditions for different parts of the premises or the different licensable activities.

- 16. Members are asked to note that they may not modify the conditions or reject whole or part of the application merely because they consider it desirable to do so. It must be appropriate to do so in order to promote the licensing objectives. Any such step must relate to a relevant representation made.
- 17. If Members grant the application, the details of the operating schedule will be incorporated into the licence as conditions. The licence will also be subject to certain mandatory conditions.
- 18. Members should note that the applicant or persons making representations have the right of appeal against the decision made by the Sub-Committee.



I should like to object strongly to the application for a licence to play live and recorded music in the parks from premises which will be part of the pavilion in the University Parks.

I think that playing music will constitute a public nuisance. Sound travels well across open spaces and I think that music being played in the Pavilion will be annoying for other users of the Parks and for those of us who live in houses adjoining them. I know that when people play musical instruments or radios etc in the parks, as they sometimes do, they are audible from the other side of the parks. If amplified music is allowed it will be an even greater nuisance.

I also wish to object to the licence application for the sale of alcohol. I do worry that having premises selling alcohol and playing music in the parks will be likely to cause a rise in disturbing and antisocial behaviour, and also an increase in crime - we are constantly being made aware of the association between alcohol and crime, and alcohol and antisocial behaviour.

The Parks are much used by children and young people. There is a nursery nearby which regularly uses it, and the students of the many it nearby schools and colleges and language schools use it. It is likely that the repercussions of the sale of alcohol would adversely affect them. I have unfortunately been unable to access the online application. And the notice posted at the Parks is only on the Keble gate, not on the North Lodge gate which many residents use: it seems remiss that the application has not been better publicised, and that the deadline for receipt of objections has been at the end of a holiday weekend when many people who live near and who are most likely to be affected are away.

Given that one is not even permitted to ride a bicycle in the park, thereby allowing for safe and enjoyable walking, to consider having music, films and above all the sale of alcohol both on and off the premises, is extraordinary.

One of the great pleasures of the University Parks is that it is enjoyed by the young and the old without any fear of being molested or bothered. Families with small children can play there, school children and young women on their own can walk through in complete safety. If there were to be the sale of alcohol within the Parks, this might not be maintained and it could also encourage under-age drinking.

There have been times in the summer months (usually in August) when picnickers have brought alcohol and music systems into the Parks and have been aggressive and badly behaved. As regular users of the Parks, we have reprimanded such people. On one occasion, a young man was openly urinating facing the path close to Keble Gate; on another occasion a young man, swigging from a bottle of beer, deliberately disrupted the games of tennis on the lawn courts by walking across them.

I know of no other park in the UK where alcohol is allowed to be sold.

The noise of music in the Parks will spoil the current peaceful atmosphere. We really hope that this licence is not granted. The likelihood of noise-pollution in amplified music is very great. The regular showing of films would also add to the noise-pollution, and would be quite unacceptable in any case in such natural surroundings 2] Alcohol. Selling alcohol in the Parks seems a recipe for disturbance. How would it be monitored? At the moment, picknickers may bring their own, and presumably cricketers celebrate in the pavilion. But a regular retail outlet is a quite different matter. We would have all-day drinking, and problems with closing the Parks at dusk. 3] Litter. I am sending this email directly to the licensing department at the suggestion of Councillor James Fry.

I was dismayed to read the planning application notice for a shop in the University Parks, and particularly alarmed by the application (by Jimbobs Baguettes Ltd.) for a licence to play music and sell alcohol. I strenuously object to both applications.

The University Parks are a precious, much used, and beloved resource for anyone to attain peace and quiet and seek spiritual refreshment. This would be stolen by the playing of live or recorded music outdoors, which Parks visitors could not choose but hear, and which would constitute a nuisance that would probably also affect houses and college buildings adjoining the Parks.

They are surely not a proper place for the sale of food and alcohol either. People who wish to eat there have always brought picnics. Young families picnicking are a regular sight, and every day many people bring their children there to play and walk, or be pushed in prams. I have already personally witnessed an ugly incident involving drunken youths in the Parks. The easy availability of alcohol throughout the day in the Parks is likely, I would strongly suggest, actively to lead to rowdiness and possible drunkenness, imperilling the safety and sense of security of parents and children.

I am also disturbed by the way in which the applications were publicised. I was only able to see the notices on the gates by Keble for the first time on 24th March. As far as I am aware this is the only site where such notices were put up. I am a frequent visitor to the Parks and almost always use either the LMH gate or the gate at the junction of Parks Road with Norham Gardens. Only by lucky chance did I see the notices as I was returning on foot in the late afternoon from the centre of Oxford. They are attached to the right hand gate, hidden from the right hand approach by the hoardings round the building site, and camouflaged by that context.

Only a postal address is given on the notice for comments to be sent to. The 25th was Good Friday, a day when no post is delivered. On the 25th I rang the telephone number offered, to be told by recorded message that the offices were closed until the 29th March, the day following expiry of the period given for objections to be registered.

Fortunately I was able to contact Dorothy Myers of the Norham Manor Residents Association who contacted our local councillor, James Fry, so that I now have an email address to send my objections to before the expiry date specified.

I am writing to you directly at the suggestion of Councillor James Fry to register a strong objection to the above planning application for a shop in the University Parks, and in particular for an application for a licence to play music and sell alcohol throughout the day.

I write as someone who has lived in Norham Road since 1993, and have enjoyed the tranquillity and beauty of the University Parks during all that period. I appalled by the prospect that alcohol might be sold between the hours of 10am and 10pm, and music played outdoors between the hours of 7am and 10pm. In fact, it is scarcely credible that such an idea could even be entertained.

The playing of music outdoors, and the selling of alcohol throughout the day, would inevitably transform the nature of the University Parks. There would be intrusive noise (which might even be heard by people outside the Parks) and the sale of alcohol would very likely lead to rowdiness, and perhaps worse. The Parks constitute a treasure for the people of Oxford, and are scarcely equalled in the centre of any other city in the country. What is proposed would be liable to change them beyond recognition.

I am also very concerned that such a controversial proposal should have been signalled by notices that were not very prominently displayed, and I question whether there has been sufficient time for local people to register the enormity of what is being proposed.

Regrettably, in recent years Oxford has acquired an unfortunate reputation in the national media as a place where excessive alcohol consumption in parts of the city centre is relatively common late at night, sometimes leading to violence. I have little doubt that a proposal to introduce the sale of alcohol and the playing of loud music throughout the day in such a hallowed place would be met nationwide with outrage and incredulity.

More specifically, with respect to the licensing application, the sale of alcohol would be inappropriate in a setting where children have free access. Moreover, as we all know, sale and consumption of alcohol has the potential to create disorderly situations and the nuisance of rowdy behaviour – all inappropriate in the University Parks where children can play safely at the moment and the public can generally walk and play sport safely.

Public safety would be compromised by drunken aggressive behaviour if this licence is approved.
