The AGM had to be suspended as a result of this issue being raised. Eventually a new board of trustees was elected at an emergency meeting of the membership. The outcome of an additional meeting between representatives of this new board and councillors and council officers to determine an action plan for the future of the centre was also largely positive. Both parties at that meeting seemed to feel that the relationship between the Association and the Council was on an improved footing. Events since this meeting have not fulfilled that promise of a fresh beginning. The Action Plan that was agreed by council and representatives of the trustees in January 2014 had still not been accepted by the wider trustee body in April 2014. This meant that we are not in a position to observe the discussion of agenda items. Given the commitment in the Action Plan to foster a new culture of transparency, this is retrograde step. It is also troubling, given the problems that arose over the last year with the bar finances (an issue, it should be noted, that has still to be resolved). The meeting of the Association in April saw a return of old, obstructive behaviours: rudeness was shown to fellow trustees for simply asking the kind of robust questions that trustees should be asking, along with attempts at obfuscation in the light of straightforward requests for information. My general feeling is that, sadly, despite the goodwill shown by some of the trustees, the association does not appear to be run in a way that is conducive to meeting the interests of the community that the centre is there to serve.</p>

None of these characteristics are evident at present and the Council's corporate objectives are certainly not being met beyond the function of room hire, which is carried out efficiently by the centre coordinator. A business plan drawn up two years ago with the help of the Council has hardly been progressed. No public consultation has taken place. Basic improvements such as the hot water system remain hampered.</p> <p>I wish it was possible to say that a change of direction was possible with the present tenancy. Alas, a culture of disaffection, bullying, and lack of trust has taken hold, even though the responsibility for this is very tightly restricted indeed and trustees speak out in favour of calm discussion and mutual respect. I have never met such dysfunction in decades of working with voluntary bodies. Those presiding (the chair rotates) find it impossible to control meetings without raising their voices or slapping the table, people are shouted down, insults and innuendo are thrown around.</p>	<p>Without it, the community would remain ignorant of the state of affairs and unable to take action to ensure that the Council's corporate objectives are met.</p>	<p>The Council installed a lift to serve disabled users of the centre.
