Conclusions: What are your conclusions drawn from the results in terms of the policy impact	The introduction of the city centre PSPO will impact on the lives of people who live, work and visit the city. The proposed restrictions will impact positively on people whose protective characteristics are impacted upon by the anti-social behaviour the order is designed to address. For example, pregnant women and disabled people can be denied access to facilities they need. Young people in breach of the order will be referred through safeguarding arrangements when appropriate. Mental health considerations are assessed on a case by case basis and support and early intervention is used prior to more serious enforcement action. This approach is detailed in Oxford City Council's Anti-Social Behaviour Policy, available on the council's website.
