Source: A consultation survey conducted from 6th to 28th June 2021, asking the public their views on restrictions on lighting fires and BBQs in certain parks and green spaces in the city, and specifically bottle-digging in Port Meadow.

There were 205 responses in total. The results can be found at the end of this summary.

Consultation summary

Based on evidence from the police, fire and rescue service, and Oxford City Council, the parks with the highest prevalence of fire damage were:

- Port Meadow, Burgess Field and Wolvercote Common
- Angel and Greyhound Meadow
- Rivermead Nature Reserve
- South Park.

Bottle-digging is specific to Port Meadow.

Respondents were asked how big a problem these issues were in each area. There was a significant response rate for each are, although each area had a large of Don't Know responses due to the very local nature of the parks.

With regards to bottle-digging in Port Meadow, respondents were asked if the issue had got better or worse.

All areas' responses found that burning logs and ground BBQs were a big or fairly big problem. Just under half of respondents thought BBQs on a stand were less of problem.

Nearly three-quarters of respondents in South Park, Angel and Greyhound Meadow and Rivermead Nature Reserve felt the issues had got worse over the last 12 months. In Port Meadow, Wolvercote Common and Burgess Field, this rose to 94% of all respondents who expressed an opinion.

There was support for banning log fires and BBQs except those on stands. Only 45% of respondents who expressed an opinion on the issue supported banning BBQs on a stand.

Bottle digging was thought to be a big or fairly big problem in Port Meadow and had worsened in the last 12 months, with 87% of respondents supporting a ban.
