The Oxfordshire Food Strategy has been developed by a multi-stakeholder partnership including County, City and District councils, Good Food Oxfordshire, community groups, local food producers and other major institutions. It has been developed to tackle the challenges of health and wellbeing; climate change and biodiversity; fair incomes and employment and a vibrant and sustainable food system. Part 1 of the strategy seeks to identify priority areas for action, links to existing initiatives and policy and showcase examples of excellence that can be learnt from and built upon.

Public and stakeholder engagement in developing the strategy initially took place during August – October 2021. This included consulting with relevant Councillors/officers across Oxfordshire local authorities, farmers markets and producers and members of the public attending food related events. A detailed timeline of engagement events will be published on the Good Food Oxfordshire website.

To support the ambitions of the strategy, action plans will be developed in partnership which will be tailored to meet the different needs of the City and the District Councils. This work will be undertaken in partnership with established community groups in each local area.
